The Bats Above Us

Most of the wild animals around Dawson are the bothersome or humdrum kind. The random possum on the porch, the raccoon family in the attic, those damnable squirrels raining down pecan shells. Coyotes and foxes range up and down our streets at night and sometimes, in broad daylight. Geckos and red-throated anoles—typically everywhere.

Other creatures are not so typical. One Saturday evening, a strange something lay stretched out underneath one of our pecan trees. It was a coppery red furry bat with wingspread of more than a foot. It didn't move, but it seemed alive. Sure that no conservationist would answer a Saturday night call for advice and also sure that our neighbor's prowling Siamese would attack it, David gently placed a metal garbage can lid over it with the idea of getting advice in the morning. Without touching it, of course.

Sunday morning we lifted the lid and found...nada! How did Red manage to lift that lid and disappear?



I called the hot line to Bat Conservation

International headquartered in Austin, and to our amazement, a bat biologist-rescuer was at our door in an hour. She looked at the spot where the bat had been and lifted two two tiny wiggling things out of the leaves and immediately began feeding them with a miniscule bottle. She informed us that these were the babies of a female Eastern red bat (*Lasiurus borealis*) who had fallen or been blown down during labor. Babies that she had been forced to abandon.

Feeling guilty for trapping her, I asked the biologist if red bat mothers always had two babies. The rescuer held up a tissue wrapped around something and gave me the bad news with a sympathetic smile: "No, here's the third one that was stepped on." She would be taking the two survivors home where she had a large cage with scores of baby red bats that she handfeeds, 24 hours a day, until they can be released. Hats off to her for this invaluable work and to all the other hardworking rescuers of native wildlife of Austin.

Red bats typically live alone, roosting in trees. It is said they especially like pecans, where ours was found. Sometimes they live in family groups, after the females give birth to one to five pups and breast feed them with four teats! Born blind and helpless, the tiny bats learn to fly in approximately one month and are weaned one to two weeks later, although some are said to hang around longer, just like human kids. I consoled myself that our girl bat would likely have more babies the next spring, since red bats can live a decade or

to cactus, and they disperse the seeds of hundreds of species of plants. Of course, we don't do enough to mitigate our destructive ways of deforestation and development, and we definitely need to improve the wind turbines that are proving to be lethal to red bats in particular.

Our girl had a good coat of auburn hair, but that protection is only good down to about 23 degrees. Austin's already dipped below that in 2025. The red bats actually need leaves on the ground for temporary hibernation when an Arctic front like last month's comes in, and so we can help them survive by turning off the leaf blower and leaving a few piles of leaves here and there.

Please spread the word about that, Dawsonites, and also tell your friends that not all bats hang out at the Congress Avenue bridge—some are our neighbors, quietly living out their lives right above us.

Approval of DNPCT October 2024 meeting notes.

IMPD Fall 2024 at Gillis Park was a success again. We moved 6 cu yards of mulch and picked up trash in record time.

City planning sent notice of 2600 Cumberland/S1st site plan, across from Ultimate Automotive. We met with the developer group twice now in the past several years.

Voting on new DNPCT officers was delayed to next meeting.

City planning sent notice of site plan for old Old Equipment, car inspection and small tool repair site on 2929 S1st street near Dawson Elementary

CapMetro had an open house to discuss South Congress Transit site last month. Site is being redesigned to allow MU and affordable housing and reflect changes to area usage and respond to transportation changes.

There is to be a trash cleanup of the Alpine Pond area on 12.14.24 @ 9am, overseen by local residents from the south side of the neighborhood.

New Landscape group in charge of Alpine Pond vegetation. Several neighbors and I have been independently in touch with Stormwater and the Landscape contractor hired to keep the area clean and maintained as per WhatsApp for the southern DNA area.

City with days just before Thanksgiving was seen collecting items and clearing camping sites along BW and SC roadway, and Texas AG is putting Sunshine Community Church on Menchaca on notice to clean up area.
